FEATURED ARTISTS



RIVANE NEUENSCHWANDER

Rivane Neuenschwander was born in Brazil. Living and working in São Paulo, she is one of the most internationally renowned Brazilian artists of her generation. Themes of mutability, geography and nature underpin her practice. Highlighting the beauty of overlooked phenomena and seemingly banal gestures, she seeks to unveil, and make sense of, the chaotic logic that underpins both the natural and man-made worlds. Her works are included in including: Tate, London; Centre Pompidou, Paris; Museu d'Art Contemporani de Barcelona; Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, New York and the Museum of Modern Art, New York.



WIM VAN EGMOND

Dutch artist Wim van Egmond's art lies deceptively close to science. Fascinated by the sometimes almost artificial way that science depicts nature, he studied painting and specialised in photography using optical techniques such as microscopy. He combines the skills of 19th century naturalists with modern digital techniques, and regularly collaborates with scientists. In recent years, he has developed techniques to create unique movies and images of fungi and other soil organisms.



EMILIJA ŠKARNULYTĖ

Born in Vilnius, Lithuania, Emilija Škarnulytė is an artist and filmmaker. Working between documentary and the imaginary, she makes films and immersive installations exploring deep time and invisible structures, from the cosmic and geologic to the ecological and political. Winner of the 2019 Future Generation Art Prize, she represented Lithuania at the XXII Triennale di Milano. Her films are in the IFA, Kadist Foundation and Centre Pompidou collections, and have been screened at the Serpentine Gallery, London; The Museum of Modern Art, New York, and numerous film festivals.



KEVIN MCGLOUGHLIN

Kevin McGloughlin is a filmmaker and artist based in Sligo, Ireland, primarily working as a director and animator. With a thirst for innovation and creativity, Kevin's initiative is to create immersive and thought provoking experiences using unconventional methods of film and animation. Mainly working in an abstracted and expressionistic form, he incorporates a myriad of experimental techniques in his endeavours. He has a particular fondness for music, especially experimental electronic genres.





FEATURED ARTISTS



THOMAS LÉON

Living and working in Paris, France, Thomas Léon works at the crossroads of cinema and graphic arts. Film, video and sound installations, as well as large-format drawings are regularly shown at screenings and exhibitions in France and internationally. His works are held in public and private collections including CNAP and the Louis Vuitton Foundation. He takes his inspirations from a hybrid set of references: avant-garde architectural projects, utopian literature, genre cinema, natural sciences.



SIOBHÁN MCDONALD

Siobhán McDonald's practice draws attention to contemporary topics dealing with air, breath and atmospheric phenomena, weaving scientific knowledge into her art in a poetic and thoughtful manner. She works with natural materials, withdrawing them from their cycles of generation, growth and decay. Working collaboratively with research facilities such as The European Space Agency (ESA) and the JRC European Commission, she explores nature in light of current ecological concerns.



AVERY ANGLE

Avery Angle is an artist and filmmaker living in Dublin. She has a strong passion for landscape painting, illustration, and bringing art to life through animation. Showcasing her love of nature, with a touch of added drama on the animated screen, she explores what film could look like where nature takes the centre stage. The Small Makings of a Storm is her graduate film and also appeared in the 2023 Dublin International Film Festival Programme.
